

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PlanCon is a lengthy process of approvals required by the Department of Education (PDE) for schools to receive reimbursement for new construction projects or for renovations of existing buildings. The PlanCon process and the reimbursement to schools for a portion of the cost has been established in the School Code and State Board of Education regulations for decades. The PlanCon approval process consists of 11 steps, covering everything from preliminary planning and facility design and to project financing and refinancing. During the extensive series of preliminary planning steps, some school districts have already issued debt prior to the approval of PDE risking the decade of promised funding for partial reimbursement for a percentage of their project costs. Wealthier districts receive a very small share (usually under 10% of the total project cost) while lower wealth districts can receive a larger state share of the project costs.

School District of Lancaster has received over 30% reimbursement on the most recent projects that begin the process in 2008

The line item for this reimbursement has been level funded since 2011-12, which is <u>down by</u> more than 11% from 2009 and ultimately non-existent in the 2015/16 and 2016/17 state budgets.

The School District of Lancaster is located in Lancaster County and encompasses an area of 10.6 square miles over the City of Lancaster and Lancaster Township. Our students are educated in 22 neighborhood schools with minimal transportation. In 2007, the School Board made a long-term decision to improve our school buildings that have not been renovated or improved in the better part of 30 years in the best case; to 75 years in the worst case scenario.

As early as 2014, we are proud to say that we were able to renovate nine of these schools at a cost of \$130MM and have begun evaluating the long-term cost of continued improvements. We were extremely fortunate to leverage Qualified School Construction Bond Financing to complete our last four buildings which has allowed us to embark on the next four school renovation projects in 2017.


The PlanCon process is long and tedious and needs an overhaul. The funding that the state provides as part of this appropriation is critical to our long-term financing plan. Without the annual funding stream, our District will be forced to raise taxes on our local homeowners and ask them to foot the bill. In a District where 23% of the assessed values are tax exempt, we have no increased tax assessment growth to support the financing of our remaining schools, and without the support of the state through this program, it creates a negative economic impact in a thriving City.


Local Economic Impact

- ➤ PlanCon Funding Not Received in 2015-2016 Budget ~ \$1,025,000
- ➤ Impact to Taxpayers to make up this revenue short-fall ~ 1.5% Tax Increase or \$41 annual increase to the average School District of Lancaster Homeowner
- ➤ PlanCon Funding in Arrears where projects are stuck in the process ~ \$871,615 since original 2010 & 2011 bond issues
- ➤ Forecasted PlanCon Funding for Remaining Projects at \$150MM Project Cost ~ \$31.5MM or \$1.5MM per year over 20 years
- ➤ In 2014 we finally received over \$4MM in arrears on PlanCon reimbursement that had been stuck in the process since May 2009. The District began the debt service payments on these bonds in June 2007.
